I am keen to see other exciting projects for the town brought to a close and fully up and running, these being our brand new Brushwood Suite at the Wades Centre (formerly known as the Community Centre), which includes a licensed bar and will shortly be available to hire for weddings, christenings parties, conferences and events. Exciting times ahead for the town and the local economy!







Sadly, the town has recently suffered the loss of both the TSB and Barclays Bank which is a great blow to not only the local economy but our residents who do not have access to online banking. Unfortunately, the Town Council do not have any powers to stop banks from closing down although we are aware that both buildings are currently up for rental.

## A new look & name for **Community Hub**

We are pleased to announce the successful completion of a circa £750,000 refurbishment and extension of the former Community Centre, which has been renamed to the Wades Centre.

Designed by local architects Morgan Architectural Designs and built by BEP Contractors the newly transformed and the extended main hall has been bought up-to-date, and will now officially be known as the Brushwood Suite.

The Suite which comprises of a large modern, bright function room with its own dedicated bar area, toilet facilities, commercial kitchen and state of the art PA system also has an external patio area overlooking the green space of Wades Park.

The large flexible space can accommodate 120 people seated or 300 standing and is soon to be available to hire for social & corporate gatherings, and special occasions.

The build which began in March 2020 is the Town Council's largest-ever investment to date and features many smart and green technologies including underfloor heating which is powered by an air source heat pump, electric heaters to provide hot water eliminating the need for fossil fuels and where possible using local materials.

## Switch Off Your Engine Campaign

Reducing Air Pollution Please Stop Idling! Air Quality Management Area Reduce harmful emissions **TURN OFF** your engine whilst stationary

Poor air quality is the biggest environmental risk to public health in the UK (British Medical Journal, BMJ)

Fossil fuel engine emissions create air pollution and are linked to climate change and lifethreatening illnesses. Leaving an engine idling is also an offence under the Section 42 of the Road Traffic Act 1988\*.

The Town Council is therefore launching a campaign to raise awareness and stop idling of stationary vehicles in the Risborough area.

One minute of idling is equivalent to one mile driven and produces enough exhaust emissions to fill 150 balloons with harmful chemicals, including cyanide, nitrogen oxides and fine particulate matter.

These can result in health conditions such as heart and lung disease, strokes or cancer and are particularly damaging to children. A new report out links air pollution to asthma in babies, and a judge has ruled that air pollution was directly to blame for one child's death. In our High Street children in pushchairs and people sitting outside the cafes are particularly at risk due to the height of the exhausts pumping out toxic fumes.

There are many misconceptions around engine idling like starting an engine uses more fuel than idling for short periods of time; starter motors are not resilient enough to withstand the engine being turned on and off; idling on double yellow lines means the vehicle cannot be classified as being illegally parked. All these beliefs are false.

The Environmental Protection Team of Buckinghamshire Council is supporting us with this initiative and has provided PRTC with some eyecatching blue signage to put up in the proposed Air Quality Management Areas in our High Street, outside schools and near bus stops.

Turning off your engine will save fuel, save money and be good for the environment. Even better walk, cycle or 'scoot' whenever possible, which is pollutionfree. Lift sharing and stacking up multiple errands to justify using a vehicle also helps as does switching to an electric vehicle. Let's work together to change our behaviour, habits and choices to reduce pollution levels and improve everyone's health. Thank you in advance for your support.

\*This enforces rule 123 of the Highway Code, which states: "You MUST NOT leave a vehicles engine running unnecessarily while the vehicle is stationary on a public road." To be specific, Section 98 of the Road Vehicles (Construction and Use) Regulations 1986/1078 requires a driver to stop the engine of a vehicle when it is stationary so far as is necessary to prevent noise or exhaust emissions, unless the vehicle is stationary because of traffic. The Dept. of Transport has stated that drivers who leave their engines running while parked could face tougher penalties and fines under new proposals.

## Protection our town assets

Did you know that within current legislation there is the ability to safeguard a building or piece of land that is of importance to the local community?

A building or land can be listed as an asset of community value if its main use has recently been, or is presently used, to further the social wellbeing or social interests of the local community and could do so in the future.

#### *Nominations can be made by:*

- local parish councils
- community groups (an unincorporated group • with at least 21 members who are registered to vote in the district)
- local neighbourhood forums •
- industrial of provident societies
- companies limited by guarantee •
- charities
- community interest groups
- To nominate an asset, groups must provide:
- the address of the property •
- details of the owner
- the extent of the site
- why they feel it is an asset of community value
- evidence of eligibility to nominate

For a nomination to be successful, evidence must be submitted to show that the asset furthers the social wellbeing and interests of the local community. This means evidence of regular community use, for example evidence of multiple community events, gatherings, or meetings.

It is often helpful for nominators to submit as much supporting information as possible detailing when and how the asset furthers the social wellbeing of the community (i.e. how often certain events take place, and the section of the community that they benefit).

The Town Council has recently set up a working group to look how we can protect our town and will be calling on our community to help with such nominations. In the meantime, do contact the Town Council office if you would like to know more.

## Are you struggling to find a meeting room? Why not consider the Market House in the heart of Princes Risborough's High Street.

This historic building, dating back to the mid-17th century occupies a prominent position in the town.
