## A message from the Town Mayor & Chairman of the Council.

May I start this article by expressing my anger and disbelief with the Russian President and the actions his government has taken with their unprovoked attack on the Ukraine. The precept for 2022/2023 has been set and further details can be found on page 3. May I take the opportunity to thank my fellow Town Councillors and our Officers for their assistance in finalising this budget.

Unfortunately our Town Councillors and I reluctantly had to agree to scrap our free weekend parking from the 1st April 2022. The cost to continue with this free service would have been around £49,000 as both car parks are owned by Buckinghamshire Council.

This would have cost the average band D precept tax payers an extra £12.98 per year on top of the 3.8% increase agreed just to balance the books. Further details about the decision can be found on our website.

I am delighted to confirm that our officers are currently planning the return of our summer festival. This week-long celebration will start on Saturday 2nd July, culminating with our popular street festival on Saturday 9th July. ## 2022/2023 Precept

It is a very important part of the Town Council's duty and responsibilities which affects us all.

The precept is the amount of money collected through your council tax for the Town Council to maintain the services they are responsible for. It will be collected by Buckinghamshire Council on behalf of the Town Council.

In view of the current financial situation, after hours of discussion, it has been necessary to leave some of the important projects which councillors would have liked to have undertaken this year for another year. The council felt it would be inappropriate at this time to raise the precept by an excessive amount. We started discussions with a proposed increase of almost 50% over last year.

In order to achieve a final increase under 4%, several projects been put to one side for the time being.

The Town Council needs to balance its books just like any sustainable business. Whilst every effort is made to minimise any rise in the precept by constantly striving to find efficiency savings and generating alternative revenue streams, some of the increases in spending are unavoidable. The increase in the cost of utilities and National Insurance affects every employer in the country as does the rent increase for the offices and other day to day expenditure.

We have reduced the amount to run the Annual Town Festival and Christmas lights event, this means extra work for our staff, councillors and reliance on the goodwill of volunteers.

Another of these is the free weekend car parking. In previous years this has been funded by grants which are no longer available to us. The precept would need to be increased by a further £49,000 (an overall increase of 16.3%) to provide free car parking, which we feel we cannot justifiably pass on to our residents.

Although finances are tight, we intend to continue to provide the level of service to which you are accustomed.

## "Kids these days...."

Have you ever found yourself making a slightly clichéd observation about the behaviour of teenagers and how it was different when you were younger? Have you ever admitted that when you were younger you misbehaved, but followed up with a caveat that you were never that disrespectful though? I'd like to offer you the

chance to have a positive impact on young peoples' behaviour and possibly change your mind about "kids these days"! Risborough Youth Club has been helping the young people of Princes Risborough and surrounding areas for almost 50 years. Managed and run by volunteers, we are open to all young people aged 11 to 17. On a typical club session we see between 20 and 40 young people, with the majority

is provide a positive and fun environment which they choose to spend their time in. This is achieved by having a great team of adults who have the right attitude; don't judge, stay positive and want to help people reach their full potential.

Research has shown that one of the most beneficial things for young people's development is for adults to take an active interest in their hobbies and passions.

The club is supported by donations, including from Princes Risborough Town Council and Buckinghamshire Council, but does not receive any allocated funding from public money. For that reason, our management committee has the difficult job of keeping the club financially viable while ensuring the services are accessible to everyone; this means keeping costs at a minimum and

subsidising trips where possible. Volunteering at the youth club is flexible; we are open every Monday night from 7 to 8.30pm, but volunteers do not need to commit to every week. All we ask is that you let us know a few days in advance if you can attend the session.

For committee members, there is also a flexible approach to commitment. The core role is to attend 3 or 4 evening meetings a year where we discuss any operational issues and provide oversight into how the club is run. After that, there are optional tasks to take on, such as updating policies, liaising

with other community groups or promoting the club (and the occasional call to arms to help with maintenance!).

This is based on estimates using historical studies that show that 34% of e-scooter rides replace car journeys, with 4,798 miles travelled on Zipp Scooters in Princes Risborough and hence replacing 404g<sup>2</sup> of Carbon per mile travelled.

On a slightly more negative note, it has become apparent that scooters have not been maintained in the correct manner. There have been reports of obstructed footpaths where scooters have not been returned to their designated bays which in turn has resulted in said scooters being out of service when rentals were attempted. The quietness of the scooters has also been raised as a concern for our residents who have visual and hearing impairments and for guide dogs who have not been trained to react to them. ## Queen's Green Canopy Update

Firstly, a big thank you all who responded to the request in November's Crosstalk to suggest sites where trees could perhaps be planted in the public realm.

We are working on researching these sites to establish their suitability and will be progressing with them through the year with a view to planting trees in the autumn or winter.

If anyone has a spot near them that they think might be suitable it's not too late to email us at the council, if you have discussed your proposals and ideas with your neighbours already so much the better as we would like to engage with as much of the community as possible.



To launch the Queen's Green Canopy Project we are delighted to have planted four trees in the King George V Park with the help of volunteers from Risborough Environmental Group, Risborough Evening WI and Monks Risborough Primary School .

We had a great morning digging and planting 3 whitebeams and a cherry at the top of the park by the Aylesbury Road.

The Whitebeam has silver foliage to reflect platinum jubilee, and are a mirror of trees in the lower part of the park. It is also thought that Whiteleaf got its name from the Whitebeam trees that grew here, so it is a local tree.

The cherry is a Prunus Pandora which has blossom that turns from pink to white and will be a beautiful addition to the park. Both are good for pollinators and the Whitebeam has berries for the birds in the autumn, do go along and see them.

We are gathering together a group of Tree Keeper volunteers to look after the trees and progress the Queens Green Canopy Project through the year. If you would like to join us please email, ring or write to the council.

## **Expansion of Risborough**

As the planned expansion of Risborough over the next fifteen years occurs, we as a council will try to keep you informed of each development. The first one of these is phase 1 of the relief road link. We have invited Buckinghamshire County officials to meet the residents to answer any questions you might have about this, hopefully we will have a date for this in the near future.

This is the relief road between the ex-Sumitomo offices along Summerleys Road to the station entrance, then through the old Hypnos site to Picts Lane only, and will occur over the next three years. It will include replacing the Aylesbury railway line bridge and lowering the road underneath it, which will unfortunately require the road being closed to both pedestrians and vehicles, for some time, we apologise for this inconvenience in advance.

This work will allow access to the proposed housing development on Park Mill to then proceed, in theory this will be the only new traffic on this

road or Shootacre Lane, and should not materially increase traffic, till the whole relief road is completed in 2035, and will not affect town centre traffic levels.

Some issues have been resolved but there are others that still need further work and the solutions have unearthed further questions e.g. safe access to the station and avoid this road acting as a barrier to the rest of the town when completed. Environmentally sound disposal of floodwater from under the bridge and paying the running costs of the required pumping station.

## The Platinum Jubilee of HM Queen Elizabeth II

The Jubilee celebrations of Her Majesty the Queen have a national framework for events with two specific dates for celebration, these are Thursday 2nd June 2022 and Sunday 5th June 2022, and the Town Council will celebrate both events.

**Beacon Celebration - Thursday 2nd June 2022** which has been designated as the date for the lighting of national beacons and this will be celebrated by the town with a beacon on Whiteleaf Cross.

The event will include a lamplight parade, at the Stratton Memorial Garden, by representatives of local schools and youth organisations, to take place at dusk which will be around 9pm.

A dedicated flame will be lighted at the Stratton Memorial Garden will then be transported to the beacon site on Whiteleaf Hill and the beacon to be lit, in line with the national event.

Attendance to this event will be limited, by invitation, to ensure the solemnity of the Garden, and the council will provide refreshments.

#### Thank you Risborough Rotarians

# Speed Watch

In the November edition of Crosstalk we announced that the Princes Risborough Community Speedwatch Group had been established and asked for members of the public to join the scheme. I am delighted to report that we now have enough members of the public to allow campaigns to begin.

We plan to start in April and have agreed on the initial 4 locations where we will monitor the traffic.

The locations selected are the main approaches and exits from Princes Risborough towards Aylesbury, High Wycombe and Longwick. Additional locations will be added in future and we ask you to contact us with suggested locations.

The Speedwatch campaigns are run using a platform created by an organisation called CSW (Community Speedwatch UK) their ethos and guiding principles can be found below. Community Speedwatch UK (CSW Ethos)

In 1829, Robert Peel formulated nine policing principles of law enforcement. Today, modern policing rests upon his notion that the police are the public, and the public are the police.

It is therefore not contradictive to suggest that cooperation between civilian volunteers and salaried police officers comes as a natural consequence of shared interests based on his ethical guidelines, especially - as is the case with Speedwatch, the voluntary work is entirely focused on early intervention by means of proactive education before anything else

preventative intervention are exhausted without success. And, enforcement should ONLY be conducted by police officers, and NEVER in the presence of Speedwatch volunteers.

#### **Integrity rules**

There is no direct enforcement involved with the efforts contributed by Speedwatch volunteers. They do not substitute low prioritised enforcement issues with 'policing-on-cheap' solutions. Neither are they "waging war on motorists", nor "retired people with nothing better to do!". Volunteers are recruited from a wide demographic representation of concerned citizens who contribute with their time to make local roads safer for everyone to use. And, by doing just that, they participate selflessly in a noble effort to save lives by raising awareness of the dangers of speeding.

#### **Checks and balances**

Every effort is continuously made to safeguard the interests and safety of ALL road users. The benefit of doubt is always on the side of drivers/riders. Vigilantism amongst Speedwatch volunteers



is not tolerated; code-of-conduct is maintained as a highly prioritised, integral part of what is expected of the volunteers' involvement. The online platform automatically manages both groups, offence records, and the supervisory/supportive involvement of the police. This human error-free methodology safeguards the overruling principle that any measurable or suspected inaccuracy is instantly and continuously reported until addressed.

Speedwatch conducted under the national initiative is synonymous with the highest possible level of integrity, honesty, noble intentions, and quality of observational data.
