A message from the Mayor & Chairman of the Council Cllr Matthew Walsh

Last year was a busy year for the Town Council, which brought new challenges and opportunities. Construction developments have been underway with new homes and employment sites. As a result of this construction, the Town Council has been able to start to spend our share of the development income on making community improvements – you can read about our support of Risborough Rangers in this edition. If you are a new resident to the Town may I take this opportunity to welcome you and hope that you will soon feel part of this great community.

I would like to thank all of you who came to our Christmas lights switch on. Moving the event to a Saturday was a risk, but one that certainly paid off judging by the huge crowds that lined the High Street. The Ice Rink proved extremely popular and the community came together to contribute to a great event. We have already begun the planning and preparation for the Summer Festival and the Christmas Light Switch on for this year.

National and Local Government faces many challenges in 2018; you have probably seen in the media recent reports of the huge challenges that some places are having in balancing their budgets. We continue to work hard to ensure we do all that we can to reduce the need for large increases to the Town Council's precept (the part of the Council Tax that comes to the town). This year we have managed to keep any increase as low as possible.

The increasing financial pressures are a significant driver in the discussions taking place as to whether to create a Unitary Council in Buckinghamshire which would merge the County and District Councils. The Secretary of State, Sajid Javid, has indicated he will decide on this soon and



we continue to monitor the situation closely.

Following the opening of the refurbished Market House, I would like to thank Sandy MacFarlane who very kindly provided a tour to the Risborough 1st Beavers. His fascinating talk about the history of the Market House captured their attention. The Town Council 2018/19 Precept

The Town Council has now set its precept for the forthcoming financial year. This is the amount of the Council Tax which is collected by Wycombe District Council on behalf of the Town Council and provided to the Council to pay for our work in the Town. Councillors have had to take into account a backdrop of inflationary pressures and





a further cut of 13.5% in the Government's Council Tax Support Grant. We want to be able to maintain the high level of services the Council provides to our residents, as well as completing a number of quality projects valued by the community. Through prudent financial management and efficient forward planning of our resources we have been able to keep this year's increase to the Precept at 1% - or viewed in a different way, an increase of 99p a year on a Band D property. We believe that the Town Council offers good value for money, but rest assured we will continue to look at ways to stretch every pound raised and keep future rises to a minimum.

Market House for Hire

Following on from the extensive restoration of the beloved Market House, we are delighted to be able to offer this facility in the town centre for hire to groups and organisations.

This historic building, dating back to the mid-17th century, occupies a prominent position in the town. The upper room has now been fitted out to accommodate groups of up to twenty who want



to use it as a facility to meet. It is fully equipped with conference room tables and chairs, wifi access, and a TV and datahub to use for presentations. In addition, there are hot and cold water facilities to make teas and coffees and a toilet. Not forgetting that it is surrounded by a vibrant High Street where you can purchase anything else you need!

This unique building is an exciting and unusual place to hold your next meeting. Unfortunately, due to the historic nature of the building, access to the upper room is only possible via an iron staircase. This means that access is not possible for those who require additional accessibility support.

Princes Risborough Parking Review 2

Last March new parking restrictions were introduced in many parts of the Town. These new parking restrictions have, in the main, provided some respite for residents and made the parking situation better for many.

However, they have highlighted some new problems, and also pushed some of the parking problems to new areas. Residents from other roads have asked if new parking restrictions could be introduced in their roads where they consider inconsiderate parking now occurs.

The parking committee, led by our County Councillor Bill Bendyshe-Brown, includes road representatives and representatives from the Town Council and the Community Bus. It has drawn up draft proposals for informal consultation with Town residents to gauge their views. There are some financial constraints which may significantly limit what we are able to achieve, but the following areas are being considered at this time:

- a. The Retreat/Highfield Road/Berryfield Road/St Teresas Close/The Avenue/Crossfield Road/Little Park. Either a single yellow line with restricted times (10-11 and 14-15) no parking or a residential parking area.
- b. Shortborough Avenue/Westmead/Berndene Rise/Windsor Hill. Single yellow line with no parking
- c. Longwick Road from Tesco roundabout to Railway Bridge/Brooke Road/Cannon Place/Pursell Place. Single yellow line with no parking between 10-11 and 14-15.
- d. A4010 Wycombe Road. Double yellow lines from Park Street to Station Road
- e. **Clifford Road/Merton Road/Culverton Hill/Parkfield Rise**. Single yellow line with restricted parking 10-11 and 14-15 or residential parking. Also, junction protection around these roads.
- f. **Fields and Trees Estates**. Cllr Ball and Cllr Coombs will undertake doorstep consultation with the affected residents to better understand residents' views.
- g. Wellington Avenue. Double yellow lines outside Windsor Lodge in Wellington Avenue.
- h. Mill Lane/St Dunstan's Close. To extend the junction protection markings on Mill Lane coming from St Dunstan's Close.



The times and days of the week for all the above restrictions would be in line with the current times and days of the week from the first parking review.

The Committee is holding an informal consultation for residents, to find out what you think of these proposals, on Wednesday 7th March in St Mary's Church Hall, Church Street, between 3pm and 8pm. 

The United Kingdom is a member of many different international organisations; NATO, the European Union, United Nations and indeed the Commonwealth. The Commonwealth is an organisation of 52 independent sovereign states with a combined population of around 2.4 billion people. Membership is diverse and member states range from the world's largest and richest states to some of the world's smallest and poorest. Most member states (but not all) were at some

point part of the British Empire, and 16 states have Queen Elizabeth as Head of State.

This year Commonwealth Day will be marked on 12th March, a day during which the Commonwealth will commemorate our shared history and values. In April the United Kingdom will host the Commonwealth Heads of Government meeting in London. Storing up goodwill – Risborough Rangers

Risborough Rangers Junior Football Club was started in 1971 and today is one of the largest clubs in the area for boys and girls aged 5-16. With FA Charter Status, Risborough Rangers fully support the FA Respect campaign to encourage good behaviour and



sportsmanship and aim to strike the right balance between improving technical skills and having fun.

On Saturday 13th January Princes Risborough Town Mayor and Chairman Cllr Matthew Walsh handed over the keys to the long-awaited purpose-built storage facility in Wades Park, allowing Risborough Rangers a safe and secure place from which to operate each weekend.

Speaking on behalf of the Town Council, the Mayor paid tribute to the work carried out by Risborough Rangers FC: "We are delighted that we are able to make this facility available. This is the first project that has been paid for by funds raised by Wycombe District Council through a levy on building new houses, allowing us to provide a greater level of support to our community groups such as Risborough Rangers. With over 70 volunteers who turn out in all weathers to support football training for local boys and girls, we are excited that they are able to benefit from this new facility."

Accepting the keys for the new purpose-built store, Andrew Quigley, Risborough Rangers Chairman, said: "Without the support of Princes Risborough Town Council, our club would struggle to provide the space required for so many teams – currently 25. The new storage facility that is being provided by PRTC will help with equipment storage and allow us to be up and running much more quickly and ready to work with some of the 450 boys and girls who play with us regularly. We are incredibly grateful that it has been possible to provide this vital facility."

The new storage facility provided on the edge of Wades Park cost £9,200 to provide and is being supplied to Risborough Rangers on a long-term lease with a peppercorn rent.

Risborough Youth Club has been working in the town for many years, but recently the club has gone from strength to strength. The building has been completely refurbished, the club has achieved charity status and now has a new smart brand. Following on from this success, the club is experiencing an upsurge in attendance by young people, regularly exceeding forty 11-17 year olds each week.

We are hugely grateful to the Town Council for its ongoing financial support of the club's activities. Town Council support has meant that we have been able to broaden the services we offer to young people. These have included trips out for kayaking, trampolining and Thorpe Park, as well as setting up a mobile skate park at the club, all of which were well received by the young people.

At the Youth Club, we believe that by providing quality youth work, we can help create the next generation of well-rounded and community minded townspeople. In order to provide a great service, the Youth Club relies on a team of dedicated volunteers to ensure that the club is a fun and safe place for everyone.

If you would like to consider volunteering at the club, the level of commitment is low (just two hours on a Monday night) and the level of reward is high! At the club, you get to know and help the many different young people that make up the teenage community of the town. Any youth work training needed will be offered and all checks and support are provided. No experience is required, just the desire to make a difference.
