# Local Plan

# **Your Final Chance to Comment!**

Wycombe District Council (WDC) has published the Local Plan for a six week consultation period, ending on 27 November. This contains the plans to significantly expand Princes Risborough, including the infrastructure needed to support the 2,500 homes proposed. They have already held a briefing on the Plan, for the north of the District, on 2 November at the Community Centre.

The purpose of this consultation is to be sure your views are heard by the Inspector appointed to examine the Plan (probably in the summer of 2018). You may want to write in to support things you like about the plan (for example if developers are promoting sites that are not included in the plan), as well as things that you don't like.

The Inspector has a specific legal remit, to test the soundness of the Plan.

It is therefore in the interests of those making representations, to submit comments spelling out the 'soundness' shortcomings, rather than just general comment.

WDC is holding two drop in sessions during the consultation period to help people fit their comments to the relevant tests. The first one was held on 9th November and a second one is planned for 16th November 2.00pm to 8pm in the Cherry Baker Room at the Princes Risborough Community Centre.

# **Kop Hill Climb**

September 2017 saw the 9th revival of the Kop Hill Climb. Over the previous 8 years it has raised over £440,000 for local good causes by showcasing wonderful vehicles in a historic setting, with a garden party atmosphere.

The climb was originally one of several throughout the Chilterns and was established in 1910.



Unfortunately the 1925 Kop Hill event saw an inexperienced driver in a Bugatti strike a spectator, who had refused to back away from the course despite being asked to do so by a marshal. The RAC steward stepped in and stopped the meeting.

A small group of motoring enthusiasts got together through RACA in 2009 to hold a celebration event on the hill. The emphasis would be on pre-war cars and bikes to highlight and capitalize on the historic nature of the venue and the climb itself.

Both the Town Council and District Council contributed to help finance the event; the rest of the income was from car and bike entrants and a small fee for spectators at the show. The co-operation of Princes Risborough School, Hampden Estates and the tenant farmer was vital and forthcoming.

The climb brought many interesting vehicle entrants and more spectators than expected, boosted no doubt by wonderful weather over that weekend.

When the dust had settled and the pennies were counted, it was discovered that there was a surplus of £18,500 which was distributed to charities and good causes in the area. Now came the dilemma. Rest on your laurels and retire to an armchair to bask in the self-satisfied glow of charitable giving, or repeat the event the following year and try to make more money for charities.

The choice was made. The team of volunteers was expanded; news spread about the great event in 2009 and 2010 produced a surplus of £31,500.

In 2015, a link was formed with Bucks Community Foundation Heart of Bucks (which is a registered charity) to take advantage of the tax exemptions that charitable status provides.

The benefits of this arrangement showed themselves in 2015 when the surplus became £78,000.

Then, in 2016 we had just over £100,000 to distribute to good causes.

Figures for 2017 are not yet available. The weather was not kind to us this year but we still had an amazing number of spectators through the gate. There will still be a significant surplus for donation, taking us well through the magic half million figure for the 9 years.

The funds generated have helped many local causes. There are details on our website (http://www. kophillclimb.org.uk/) of the charities we assisted last year.

If you are not a Kop Hill Climb supporter yet, please come next year. The dates are 15/16th September.

We would love to see you there and we guarantee you and all the family will experience a wonderful show with great atmosphere. You cannot fail to have a great time.

### The Market House Restoration

Princes Risborough's Market House once again stands pristine, after the third major restoration in its three hundred and sixty or so years. A mid-17th C building, its age may be inferred from an inscription on the present Market Bell - "Market Bell Princess [sic] Risborough 1661 recast 1824".



The original building had a simple timber framework, with the arches of the lower storey of brick, while the upper storey, accessed by ladder, had a herring-bone infill of tile and plaster. The roof appears to have been a single ridge with a belfry at the end facing the High Street.

In 1824 the ground area was extended on three sides by a sloping roof, and the upper storey, used as a granary, was rebuilt in brick. The now pyramidal roof was crowned by a central cupola with re-cast bell, weather-vane and a single dial clock.

In 1920 further restoration took place and the Market House was dedicated as the town's War Memorial. A new four-dial clock replaced the original, and soon afterwards the ladder access was replaced by a wood and brick stairwell, a practical move to facilitate Parish Council meetings in the upstairs chamber, but which marred the open plan by blocking the rear two arches.

In 2015 the Town Council commissioned a survey by Phil Ogley, of Oxley Conservation, Historic Buildings Consultants based in Henley. This revealed serious problems with the roof timbers and widespread damage from damp. MDJ Builders of Reading have carried out a full restoration, including replacing inappropriate cement mortar with traditional lime. Smith of Derby Ltd renovated the clock mechanism and dials, and the staircase has been replaced by an open wrought metal stairway by craftsmen at Gomme's Forge, Loosley Row.

Today the Market House, with its open market cross appearance restored and its upstairs chamber fully re-furbished with facilities appropriate to this digital age, fully justifies its Grade II\* listing as a building of historic importance, and is ready to regain its place as a functional asset to the town.

### **Street Lights Set for LED Upgrade**

A working group of councillors has held meetings with all the companies who wished to tender for the replacement of our old incandescent lanterns on the poles with new energy saving LED lanterns. Following on from our shortlisted tenders our plan is that we will replace approximately 450 lanterns over several months.

Because we will be changing all the old lanterns in the first instance which are dotted randomly around the town many roads will have a mixture of new LED lamps plus older style ones for the time being. This will of course be corrected next year.

The Council will see immediate energy savings from the new technology which of course leaves funds available to be spent elsewhere in the budgets.

Samples of our new lights are being installed in Ash Road; as ever we value your feedback.

# **Town Council grant helps local runners!**

Risborough Run in the Park started on November 11th 2014, when four runners (Trevor Lynch, Kate Smith, Ruth Stevenson and Juliette Packham) got together in Wades Park for a 5k run. It was a typical, soggy November morning, but that did not dampen their determination to turn this into a successful weekly event for the people of Princes Risborough. Almost three years later, the run has 586 registered runners and averages thirty people per run each Sunday.

The key aim of the run is to provide a safe, friendly and nurturing environment for runners of all ages and abilities to come and join in a weekly 5k. It doesn't matter if someone is on a couch-to-5k programme, recovering from illness or injury, or is a regular runner – all are welcome. Entire families running together (sometimes with buggies and dogs) are also a common sight with us.

The route is entirely within Wades Park, looping a number of times around the outskirts of the park. It is also free to all – license and insurance fees (to England Athletics and Run Britain) are covered through generous donations from a number of sponsors (including Princes Risborough Town Council) and also donations from the runners themselves.

Risborough Run in the Park is on every Sunday morning at 9am in Wades Park rain or shine. They also occasionally have special fun runs (such as the Risborough Festival Fun Run, or the Santa Dash). If you have been considering getting out for a run, there is no time like the present to join in with this successful Risborough event.
